Commemorating the Armistice of 11th November 1918

This Special Parish Council Newsletter, which commemorates the Armistice of 11th November 1918, is a record of the men from Sleekburn, Cambois and Bedlington Station who were killed in the conflict, together with some hint of how their families must have suffered in the aftermath of their deaths.

It is the result of countless hours of research and many fascinating conversations. It has been created as a mark of respect to the families of this community and as testimony to the courage of its men and its women.

The total numbers of men killed in this "war to end all wars" are so great, that individual tragedies are submerged. We have tried to reflect how these tragedies affected this one small community. Others could paint a similar picture of their own towns and villages.


The War Memorials of Cambois and St John's tell us only name and initial. Without the evidence of living memory certainty is difficult. However, families have preserved memories, papers, photographs, medals. All these things have been shared and have allowed a glimpse of that dark cloud, which settled on this community more than a hundred years ago. Through that cloud, it has been possible to see shreds of the lives of forebears, their work, their loves, their grief as the months went by. For indeed, between 1914 and 1918, hardly a month passed without news of yet another tragedy. Pit-work was dangerous and dirty, but nothing could have prepared the families for what was unfolding, far from home.

Of the lives of those who survived there is very little record, unless they went on to make their mark in other ways. "He never talked about it" is so often heard, so the irony is that official records tell us more of those who were killed, than about the men who returned to try to re-build their lives. So many families were fragmented, and children dispersed amongst relatives, that very few personal written records survive.

Some widows re-married and a new father took responsibility for their children. Some did not. Families stepped in, as they had always done, as they always do, and life went on.

That is perhaps the most surprising, most impressive, most frustrating thing. Men stopped talking about their experiences; wives and children forgot; life went on.

Sometimes, stories have been preserved as if by chance, and some are presented here. But every one of these men has a story and space is limited. If you wish to know more, please contact us and we will be happy to share what we have discovered.



Our community produced no officers – they were drawn only from the public schools – and the newspapers of the time were rarely interested in 'other ranks'. This announcement is from the Newcastle Journal of Saturday 21st October, 1916, the week after the death of Private William Neil, of Back Clayton Street, whose young fiancée in South Shields shared the tragedy of his loss:

"Biographical Information as to officers who have fallen will be welcomed by the Daily Journal".

Privates didn't count for much and this is one of the reasons why tracing some of these men has proved so difficult. Only the British war cemeteries separate soldiers, even after death, into 'officers' and 'men' and the myth that the nation lost "the bravest and the best" is the ultimate insult to those who returned. They all faced the same foul conditions, the same deprivations and the same fear.

We hope that this slim record will reveal something of the strength and resilience of the families here, who rallied round and supported the widows and orphaned children (87 children were left fatherless). Many of those families are still here, and that same spirit survives in our community.

What is recorded on War Memorials is evidence of people's memories, and they can play tricks. Some men have proved elusive and we cannot yet be certain about their identity. Their names are listed below, rather than alongside their comrades. One day they might be found. Perhaps others will be encouraged to pursue their own research. If you can add anything, we would love to know.



Joyce Jackson grew up in Cambois and now lives in Bedlington Station.

Her Father, Will Kennedy, served in the Northumberland Fusiliers in Mesopotamia (modern Iraq) and returned to start a family with Margaret Jane Harkus Gibson (they married in 1919).

Margaret (Jinnie) was housekeeper, first to Dr. Bingham in Cambois, then when he enlisted in February 1915, moved to London and lived and worked in the household of Dr. William Barkley in Southfield, London. Whenever soldiers from Cambois arrived back in England on leave, they were told to contact her and she would look after them. Which of course she was proud to do. She returned to Cambois when her brother Frank Gibson, was killed.

Dr. John Warnock Bingham enlisted in the Royal Army Medical Corps in February 1915, and is commemorated as Captain Bingham in the Communal Cemetery in Mons, Belgium.

Jinnie Gibson's brother, Frank, was killed in 1917. He is buried in 'The Huts Cemetery', close to Ypres. An irony, because in later years, his parents lived in 'The Huts', Cambois.

Will Kennedy's elder brother, Albert, was killed in 1918 and is buried in Soissons, France.

After the death of John George (Jack) Millican in 1917, Will Kennedy's father, Thomas Jackson, married Jack's widow, Mabel (Hamblin). Jack and Mabel had been married for exactly one week when he was killed.

It's a small world sometimes.



Elsie Branley, too, has lived in Bedlington Station and Cambois for all of her 93 years. Her mother is one of 4 young women, all born in 1899 and classmates in the first ever class of what is now Bedlington Station Primary School, whose names are on the plaque in the school hall:

Jane Peel Kinghorn was Elsie's Mother and we believe that all four young women enlisted in the newly formed Women's Army Auxiliary Corps in 1917. Unfortunately, those records are now lost.

Jane met her husband, George Pharoah of West Sleekburn, in the Ripon training camp, and they were married in St. John's Church on November 1st 1919. George had been wounded and carried a bullet in his knee until the day he died.







Elsie's Grandfather, George Kinghorn, was one of two brothers killed. George's widow never re-married, and Elsie remembers her as an old lady, dressed in black, who spent most of her time 'on the cooch'.

George, the younger brother by six years, is standing.

Between them the Kinghorn brothers left 10 orphaned children. Robert Kinghorn's widow, Lizzie, married Weatheritt James 1920 and went on to have three more children to add to the seven she already had.

GALLIPOLI

Gallipoli The Dardanelles Suvla Bay Cape Helles (1915)

2200 miles from home and different names for the same place

In 1915 my country said, son
It's time to stop mining
There's work to be done
So they gave me a tin hat
And they gave me a gun
And they marched me off to the war.

Of the one million men involved in the Gallipoli campaign between one third and one half became casualties. Of the 44,070 Allied soldiers killed 8,709 were Australians. About 86,000 Turks were killed.

Some young men from Cambois and Sleekburn enlisted in the Royal Navy, perhaps thinking that they might see something of the world. This is as far as they got.

20,956 Commonwealth servicemen have no known graves and are commemorated on the Helles Memorial, on a headland overlooking the straits of the Dardanelles.

It is sometimes possible to discover something of the men behind the names:

Edmund Silverton, of Gees Houses, Cambois Colliery, was unmarried and thrifty: he left his parents £25 in his will.

Able Seaman William Robinson SHAW (25) and Able Seaman Robert SHAW (20) were the younger brothers of Private Francis Robinson SHAW who was killed on the Somme on 29th August, 1916, aged 32.

Nicholas Reay Millican lied about his age – he said he was born in 1895, but was actually baptised on 23rd March, 1898 at Cambois St. Peter's.

John Thomas Millican, his elder brother, was also baptised in Cambois St. Peter's; on 5th November, 1892.

Private Hebbie ANDERSON, of 35, Back Clayton Street, was killed just two days after landing aged 19

JUTLAND

The Battle of Jutland took place 31st May – 1st June 1916, off the Danish coast.

The **Black Prince** was sunk with the loss of **857 men**. Amongst them was:

Able Seaman Robert Milburn Dixon of 13 Boathouse Terrace, Cambois, aged 17.

HMS Indefatigable was sunk with the loss of **1,017 men.** Amongst them was:

Able Seaman Randall GREEN, aged 29. He worked at the 'A' Pit.

His wife of less than six months posted this notice in the Blyth News of 25th May, 1917: In affectionate remembrance of my dear husband, Randall Green of Hartford, who lost his life in the Battle of Jutland, May 31st, 1916.

> One year has passed when from home he took his leave. In youth and health We little thought the humble grave did wait for his return.


> > Think of him in silence. No eye may see me weep

HMS Shark was sunk with the loss of 86 men. Amongst them was :

Able Seaman Albert Edward MORRIS of 19, Sinkers Row, Cambois aged 18.

The details on his record, together with the official stamp, make a poignant record.

ARMISTICE DAY

At 11 am on the 11th day of the 11th month 1918, the guns finally fell silent. The armistice marked the end of the bloodiest conflict that the world had ever seen. Four years of horror that resulted in 20 million deaths and 21 million wounded.

Historians have categorised the First World War as the first 'Total War'. For the first time there were significant numbers of innocent civilian casualties, more than 8 million civilians were killed in Europe, Africa and Turkey. For the first time aeroplanes, tanks and submarines were used as weapons. This was an industrial war. It is estimated that over 8 billion bullets were fired, and 1.5 billion artillery shells. Even today, 100 years later, French and Belgian farmers are uncovering up to 200 tons of steel in the ground every year. This is known as 'The Iron Harvest'.

Although 11/11/1918 was the end of the fighting, it was not the end of the war. The First World War did not officially end until seven months later, when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919 and registered with the newly-formed League of Nations. In that seven month period, troops were still deployed in Europe in case fighting flared up again.

The last casualty from our parish before the armistice was Private William John Angus of the 20th Battalion, The Manchester Regiment. Bill was 31 years old and lived at 2, Red Row, Bedlington Station. He was shot in France on the 6th of November, 5 days before fighting stopped. He left a wife, Isabella, and a small daughter. Two more local men died later of their wounds: Private George Chilton of 66, South Row, and Serjeant Fred Carruthers of 2, Pioneer Terrace.

As if the war were not horrific enough, 1918 saw the start of what has been called the greatest medical holocaust in history: the Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918/20 caused the deaths of at least 50 million worldwide, around 3% of the world's total population at that time. Many believe that it was spread so quickly due to the large concentrations of men in the trenches.

At the time, the war was called 'The War to End All Wars'. Everyone agreed that destruction and misery

on this scale would never be allowed to happen again. However, twenty years later, on September 3 1939, with resentment and unrest still simmering throughout the world, war in Europe was declared once again.

The Second World War, which raged across the globe for six years, was even more destructive than 'The Great War, and resulted in 60 million deaths.

500 miles from home

"Here are recorded the names of men of the Britis<mark>h</mark> Armies who fell on the Somme battlefields, but to whom the fortune of war denied the known and honoured burial given to their comrades in death. "

Because men who enlisted together, went into battle together, July 1st 1916 was a black day for Bedlingtonshire. When they 'went over the top', each man was carrying some 70 pounds of equipment – in most cases more than half his own bodyweight – and they were instructed to WALK towards the German trenches, across muddy ground strewn with the barbed wire which the shelling had not destroyed. A German listening post had picked up the 'good luck' message sent out by a British staff officer, and the machine gunners were prepared for the coming attack. Tough coal miners they were, but this was a challenge over which they had no control. Even those who survived may never have worked again.

The Thiepval Memorial commemorates 72,246 men of British and South African forces who died during the Somme offensive of 1916 and have no known grave.

Each year on July 1st, a ceremony is held at the memorial to mark the first day of the Battle of the Somme, when 29 men from this parish alone were killed.

19 children in Bedlington Station were orphaned on this single day.

These two very different memorial messages were published in local newspapers in 1917, one year on :

A British hero to the heart,
His precious life he gave;
He died upon the battlefield,
The British flag to save.

Out in a lonely churchyard

Amidst the shot and shell,

Where our dear son lies asleep,

He for King and country fell.

In the bloom of life death claimed him,
In the pride of his manhood days,
None knew him but to love him,
None spoke his name without praise;

If those who made this awful war
Were the ones to fight,
There would be less sorrow in hearts
In many homes tonight.

POSTSCRIPT

In 1914, Cambois Colliery employed 1019 men and the Bedlington 'A' Pit 1026 men.

Not one of the men who enlisted here was born in the 20th century, and their parents and most of their grandparents had known only one monarch – Queen Victoria. In some ways it could be an exact parallel with today, but how to put ourselves in the minds of these men and their families? Their grandparents had shared their time with the American Civil War, Custer's last stand, the Boer War. They had known a world without moving pictures, without motor vehicles, without barbed wire. Their spirit of camaraderie lifted them; they lived together, worked together, died together. On our list is Shoeing Smith Henry Jennings; and he was needed in the British Army: in 'The Great War' horses were central to the action and some 8 million died.

These men believed that 'their King and their Country needed them so' as the song has it, and surged to join the fight without ever understanding its causes. Now 'The Great War' has become an industry, described in countless thousands of books, films and magazines; but it is fact, not fiction, and we have tried here to hint at the effect on communities so many miles away from the war zone, and in so many countries.

Talking to school-children reveals just how remote that time feels. When a world without holidays and wi -fi seems unlikely, the task of reaching into the minds of a century ago is a challenge. And yet, these stories of unquestioning courage and devastation do still have the capacity to touch our emotions.

Two men from Cambois were taken as prisoners of war;

One world-famous surgeon, born in Bedlington Station, was decorated by both the British and the French for his work in helping the wounded;

One lady teacher from the Station School was a distinguished nurse during 'The Great War'.

In 2016, to commemorate 100 years since the death of one young soldier from the Bedlington 'A' Pit, a tub of Bedlington soil from the street where he lived, was taken to France and spread over his grave. He now lies under both French and British soil.

We plan to share these stories, and more, in future editions of our Parish Newsletter.

The Armistice meant a cease -fire for all combatants, and a chance to bury their dead. This German Memorial Stone reveals thousands of men, many no doubt coal miners, in a common grave.
